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# In Lent we repent, in Easter we act

s we come to the end of our Lenten journey, we look back, and some of us did a lot of reflecting, meditating, praying, letting go of particular foods or things we

### **Reformation 2017 - Luther's Catechism:** "Small" with a Big Impact

That does this mean? For three years in Junior High School, this question haunted my Fridays nights. On Saturday mornings my classmate and I were scheduled to meet with Pastor Cartford for Confirmation classes. The assignment included memorizing the answers to "What does

this mean?" in Martin Luther's Small Catechism. Many of you have similarly memories! For nearly five hundred years the Small Catechism has served among Lutherans as the primary teaching tool for the youth (and adults, too) of the church. Nothing that Luther wrote has had a more direct

influence on the lives of ordinary Christians than this. Martin Luther wrote the Small Catechism in 1528 in response to a need among the laity in the reforming congregations. The many theological debates and changes in church life

that accompanied the Reformation had created a lot of confusion and misunderstanding among ordinary churchgoers. Luther wrote the Catechism for heads of households as a primer to teach their children the basics of the faith: the Ten Commandments; the Apostles' Creed; the Lord's Prayer; the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper: the Office of the Keys (confession and forgiveness); and prayers for daily life. These were to provide touchstones for understanding and living the faith. So why has it endured as a useable catechism through the centuries? First of all, the chief characteristic of the Small Catechism is its pastoral heart: its accessibility and lack of polemic, its directness and brevity. It aims to convey a personal faith. For example, the explanation of the First Article of the Creed reads: "I believe that God has created me together with all that exists. . ." To recite the Creed is to make it our own. God is for me and all people.

In his explanations of the Commandments, Luther turns the negative (e.g., "You shall not kill") into a positive action ("We



lives of our neigh-

bors, but instead help and support them in all of life's needs"). Luther lifts up the living spirit of the Commandments over the dead letter of the Law.

The *Small Catechism* also legitimizes our questions. "What does this mean?" is a part of faith seeking understanding. Pastor Pedro tells me he brings three questions to a biblical text: What? So what? What next? I once saw a poster that read: "Jesus came to take away your sins, not your mind." I don't believe that Luther saw his short explanations in the catechism to be the last word about the faith. They are meant to provoke us to explore the heart of our Christian faith with open minds, transformed hearts, and the courage to act in light of the Gospel.

And the genius of Luther is that he kept it short, that is, "small." He also wrote what is called the *Large Catechism*, which explained the basics of the faith in much more nuanced theological language and with long answers. But, other than Lutheran seminarians, few read or study the "large" version of the catechism. In the brevity of the *Small Catechism* we are touched by the heart of a man with a living faith, confident in God's grace toward him and us.

Has it been a while since you looked at the *Small Catechism*? It can be found at the back of our hymnal, pp. 1160-1167. Check it out some Sunday at church. Or find it on-line. Take a new look. Be surprised and encouraged in your faith journey. There really is nothing small about it!
