## What is Mardi Gras?

Every Tuesday right before Ash Wednesday, there is a celebration called Mardi Gras. Many people associate it with a crazy party time in New Orleans, and there is a reason for that.

Mardi Gras has its origin as a celebration in the Christian tradition, although not so much as a religious observance by the church per se. Some even trace it as a syncretism with ancient pagan traditions like many other Christian practices throughout history. The literal meaning of the French is Fat Tuesday. It is like saying good bye to the fatty foods before the time of penance and reflection in Lent.

Melitta Weiss Adamson and Francine Segan in their book Entertaining from Ancient Rome to the Super Bowl share that, " In Anglican countries, Mardi Gras is known as - Shrove Tuesday -



from shrive meaning "confess"-or Pancake Day"-after the breakfast food that symbolizes one final hearty meal of eggs. butter, and sugar before the fast. On Mardi Gras Day, the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, the last parades of the season wrap-up and the celebrations come to a close with the Meeting of the Courts (aka the Rex Ball locally). On Ash Wednesday, the morning after Mardi Gras, repentant Christians return to church to receive upon the forehead the sign of the cross in ashes."

The practices and cele-

bration of Mardi Gras vary from country to country. In the United States it is not a national celebration. It arrived as a traditional French practice introduced by the Le Moyne brothers in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and parts of Texas. That's why it is associated with New Orleans. Christian traditions exist to repeat practices related to our faith as a learning process and nobody says it has to be boring. Granted that some people take it too far, but we should not "through the baby with the bath water" as the saying goes. We should allow some celebrations related to our faith in order to

## **Begin Lent with Your Ashes**



The imposition of ashes is a tradition that dates back to the so called Old Testament or Hebrew Scriptures. The Jews used it as a sign of grief, sorrow, repentance, pleading to God, or even to prepare for battle. They use to rip their clothes, and throw ashes on their bodies as they enter a spiritual time of prayer

and fasting. In the Christian tradition it has been kept as a sign of repentance and since the end of the first millennium it has

been observed at the beginning of Lent. Some fundamentalist Christians
teach to avoid the practice
stating that it has pagan
origins. Well, you can trace
almost anything to paganism, but we Lutherans believe that it is a good practice, a symbol of our faith
in Jesus Christ. Like many
other rituals, the imposition of ashes has a powerful influence on the way
we care for our spiritual

help out. I know you're out there and I know you can do it, so come join us and remember,


# "With God all things are possible"

God Bless all of you and I continue to say thanks for all your blessings and your help when I




