REFORMATION 2017 -- THE "THREE SOLAS"

otable movements in N history have often been accompanied by words or phrases that capture the

hearts and imagination of people and then become short-hand for what that movement is all about.

"Liberte! Equalite! Fraternite!" -- the cry of the French Revolution. "Remember the Alamo!" galvanized the Texans revolt. "We

shall overcome!" arose as the anthem for the Civil Rights Movement. Martin Luther and the early



Church Reformers of the 16^{th} Century also had a short-hand for their movment: Sola gratia (grace alone)—Sola fide

(faith alone)—Sola Scriptura (Scripture alone). These three phrases-the "three so*las*"—became touchstones for

the Reformers' central theological concerns and have endured as a legacy to remind us of the essentials of our faith.

Sola Gratia-How are we to under-

stand who God is for us, how our relationship to God is established and maintained? Continues on page 2...

Luther wanted to make it perfectly clear that It is *God alone* who takes the initiative and does all that is necessary to make us God's sons and daughters.

That's why it is "amazing grace." We don't earn it. We don't add to the saving work God has done for us. Consequently, we don't have to justify our breathing and taking up space in this world. It is pure gift, pure grace, pure love. ("For it is by grace you have been saved . . . " Eph. 2:8)

<u>Sola Fide</u>—The grace of God is met in our lives by faith. Faith is the Spirit in us, responding to God's "Yes" to us with our "Yes!" to God. *Faith alone connects us to God*. More than just as set of beliefs, faith dares to *trust* the promises that God redeems us and accompanies us even the "valley of the shadow of death." Faith embraces our status as daughters and sons of God, sisters and brothers to one another. Faith activates our love for others, not in order to earn God's favor, but because God has shown mercy and compassion toward us. (For it is by grace you have been saved *through faith* . . . Eph. 2:8) Faith means our soul has a pulse!

<u>Sola Scriptura</u>—In a world of competing authorities, who or what can we trust most to teach and to shape our faith? A tradition? A pastor or pope? A Church or



Synod Council? Our own experience? Our grandmother? For the Protestant Reformers, the *Scripture itself stands alone* at the top of all hierarchies of authority. It is the one norm against which all others are to be weighed and judged. But within Scripture—a complex and varied set of books—is a central message. Using a Christmas image, Luther once likened the Bible to the *manger* holding the Christ-child for us. For Luther, the authority of Scripture rests in its chief function to bear the Word— Jesus Christ—to us. A Living Word to engender a living faith. Good biblical preaching is meant to be a vehicle of that "living Word" among the followers of Jesus, providing a right discernment of Law (showing us our need for God) and Gospel (the Good News of God' favor).

Are these Reformation touchstones still relevant to faith today? Do we really believe in "grace alone" and "faith alone" in a culture that exults the "self," that teaches us to trust little beyond our experience, and that guides us to seek first nothing other than our own selffulfillment? Do the Scriptures still command our attention in the midst of pervasive biblical illiteracy (a significant number of Americans don't even know how Jesus died!). Are we drowning in information-overload? Do we listen to fake news as if it had authority? Do we dare to hear the Word of God?

Perhaps, we could do well to reclaim anew the passion of the Reformers and make their slogan our own:

Grace alone! Faith alone! Scripture alone!
