## **Quincentennial Year of the Reformation 2016 - 2017**

"The true treasure of the Church is the most holy gospel of the glory and grace of God." ---

Martin Luther, Thesis 62

7 ittenberg, Germany, October 31, 1517. On the door of the castle church at Wittenberg University, a young Biblical Scholar named Martin Luther posted 95 theses for debate by the university scholars and theologians. The topic was indulgences—the means by which souls could shorten their time in purgatory, according to medieval church theology. The time and place of Luther's action was not accidental. All Saints' Seminary in Wittenberg held one of the largest collections of religious relics in Europe. Each year on November 1, All Saints' Day, these relics could be viewed by any penitent who made a pilgrimage to Wittenberg. The penitent could thereby receive an "indulgence" of up to 500,000 years off their time in purga-

At the same time, plenary ("all time off") indulgences were being sold for cash. The young Albert of Brandenburg had paid the Vatican treasury 25,000 ducats to secure the papal appointment as Archbishop of Mainz. In order to repay the bankers who had loaned the money. Albert was permitted the sale of indulgences throughout Germany. For Martin Luther, these practices were a corruption of the Church and a clear and unjustifiable distortion of the Gospel.

Aided by the latest communication technology—the print-

ing press—a movement now called the Protestant Reformation was unleashed. Luther and his ideas for the reform and renewal of the Church gained a wide hearing

and engendered spirited debate. Within the next four years, Luther "found his voice" on the many issues central to reforming Christian faith and practice


The Reformation was a powerful force, but did not bring unity to the Church. Luther himself was excommunicated in 1520 and declared an enemy of the Holy Roman Empire in 1521. Only the


protection of the Duke of Saxony kept him alive. Though the Counter-Reformation brought many needed changes in the Roman Catholic Church, common ground and good will had been lost among Western Christians.

Protestants of many varieties and Catholics came to harbor suspicions, resentments, and even hatred of one another.
Bloody sectarian wars erupted from time to time, most notably the Thirty Years War that ravaged Central Europe in the 17th century. Nonetheless, the chief legacy of the Protestant Reformation has endured—the clear and firm grounding of Christian theolo-

gy in Scripture and its central witness to the grace of God in Jesus Christ.

What does the future hold? Since the Second Vatican Council of the Catholic





reached out to one another. In 1999. Lutherans and Catholics formally agreed to a common understanding of "justification by faith"—the chief theological issue for Luther at the time of the Reformation. In 2015, a lengthy document "Declaration on the Way: Church, Ministry and Eucharist" was published. It outlines the many theological and pastoral problems that have been resolved, past misunderstandings that have been laid aside, and proposals for hopeful paths to approach the dwindling number of issues that still divide us.

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#### Quincentennial Year of the Reformation 2016 - 2017

This quincentennial year begins with an historic commemoration. On Monday, October 31, 2016, leaders of the Lutheran World Federation and its member

churches, including the ELCA, will convene in Lund, Sweden, along with Pope Francis and leaders of the Roman Catholic Church, for a time of prayer and remembrance. (Go to the ELCA website for a link to the live webcast of these events,

beginning at 7:30 a.m.) We pray that during this year of the Reformation all Christians may be bound more closely as members of the Body of Christ.


# Saturday, November 5 - Wine &
