At the font we are a given a new birth as children of God. As God made a covenant with Abraham, in baptism God promises to raise us up with Christ to new life. From worship we are sent forth to proclaim God's love for all the world.



The almighty and merciful Lord grant you pardon, + forgiveness, and remission of all your sins. **Amen.**





SECOND READING: Romans 4:1-5, 13-17

A reading from Romans.

¹What then are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? ²For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. ³For what does the scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness." ⁴Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. ⁵But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness.

¹³For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.


¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations")—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.

¹¹"Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. ¹²If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? ¹³No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. ¹⁴And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵that whoever believes in him

may have eternal life.

¹⁶"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

¹⁷"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."



NICENE CREED

After all exchange the Peace, the assembly is seated.







At St. Stephen we receive Holy Communion by receiving the bread and then either drinking directly from the cup or by intinction: That means that you may **receive the bread in your hand and then dip bread in the wine**.)

Gluten free bread is available on the right side. (please ask) Alcohol free wine is available on the right side. (please ask)



Teaching Series—Living Lutheran: The Small Catechism



Lent is the time to get back to basics. Each Thursday in Lent we are considering one of the 5 chief parts of Luther's Small Catechism:

(March 5 was— The Ten Commandments)

March 12— The Apostles Creed March 19— The Lord's Prayer

Mach 26— The Sacrament of Holy Baptism & Confession

April 2— The Sacrament of Holy Communion

In the early church, and in many places again today, this is a time to prepare new Christians for Holy Baptism at Easter. One of the baptismal tools the church has used since 400AD is a "catechism." This comes from a Greek word that means to echo or repeat back. Following the Reformation, Martin Luther simply followed this ancient tradition, adapted now for his new situation. Countless Lutherans have studied this catechism prior to confirmation since the 1500's. It is still relevant today as a basic summary of the central beliefs of the Christian faith.

Precautions during the Coronavirus outbreak

While there is no need for panic in any way, it is good to take some precautions during this time. During the exchange of Peace during the liturgy some people may choose not to shake hands. Just turning to your neighbor and saying, "Peace be with you" is sufficient in these circumstances. Others might choose a gesture such as an elbow touch, a fist bump, or a simple bow.

Still others will still choose to shake hands or embrace. There is no legislation on this, please choose a sign for now with which you are comfortable. It may be advisable just to greet those immediately around you and not leave your pew to travel around the nave.
