#### **A Letter from Our Pastor**

Dear sisters and brothers,

This year, the Feast of the Epiphany, January 6, falls on a Sunday. This Sunday is the climax of the Christmas season—the day that magi from the East arrive to worship the Christ child and bring their gifts. The scripture readings for Epiphany help us understand that the manifestation of God is for all people everywhere. This is a message of radical inclusively. Those who were once far off are now embraced by the one true God, who has sent a Savior into the world. Now we are called in baptism to be the messengers!

I am always drawn to Epiphany and the "ordinary" Sundays that follow as a time to think about the church's mission and outreach with the gospel. In early December, our Assistant to the Bishop, Pr. El Yateem, led us in a conversation about the results of the vitality study conducted here before my arrival. My take away from that time is like every church, St. Stephen has both strengths and growing edges. One of our lead strengths is our warmth and welcoming embrace for all who worship here. We are good at hospitality and pastoral care. Areas that we have room for growth include becoming more connected in concrete ways with the community around us and our engagement of spiritual practices, such more participation in Christian formation and bible study.

Some present naturally longed for the days of full pews and Sunday Schools. It is important to keep in mind that the world has changed greatly in the past generation. The church was once the center of culture. Now the church is more on the margins. At best, one in five people attend any church. Studies have shown that younger people are looking for relevance, not meetings. How does worship relate to everyday life? How is this church making a difference in the community? What spiritual practices will connect me to the Divine? When people are asked what brought them to a church, the most frequent answer by far is that they were invited by another lay person. The thing we want to avoid is the sense that we want people here to simply fil the pews. The church is called to be in the business of changing lives.

The Book of Acts provides a great guide to how the church in the first century grew. Beginning on Tuesday evenings, January 8, from 7-8pm we will study the book of Acts together as we discern where God is calling us (this will be repeated on Sunday mornings from 9:15 to 10am starting January 13). This is where we need to start if we want to be a vibrant congregation. If you are interested in discerning ways that St. Stephen can thrive, we need to start with scripture. Join us! Be part of the conversation! May the light of Epiphany for ALL people shine though us. Hope to see you at one of these weekly studies. —Pastor Bob

ne thing that a visitor to St. Stephen, or most other Lutheran churches, will notice is that worship leaders wear distinctive garments called vestments. Some modern Americans might think vestments are odd but, think about it, we use them in our society too. A judge wears a special robe based on academic garb to signify his or her education and knowledge of the law but also that the judge's role in the court is different from the other participants. The distinctive clothing worn by police officers, nurses, and many other professions communicates their role; vestments function in a

similar way.

In the Old Testament, God not only regulated the details of divine worship, but He also prescribed the type of dress to be worn by the priests in the performance of their priestly office. In the New Testament no such regulations were laid down. Jesus recalled life in the Kingdom when he said, "Do not be anxious about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, nor about your body what you shall put on." (Matthew 6:25)

While specific vestments are not required in Christian worship and they developed over time; they do add beauty, transcendence and meaning to worship. Vestments are worn by pastors, lay assisting ministers, acolytes, communion ministers, choirs and cantors. Vestments are more related to uniforms than costumes; they communicate the role of the leader. They also say that an individual is functioning in a particular relationship to a community of believers and connected to a recognizable, historic pattern of leadership. Worship leaders wear vestments on behalf of the assembly. The basic liturgical outfit is a white garment called an alb. The alb reminds us of the white garment presented or worn at baptism. It is the basic baptismal dress that may be worn by all worship leaders. The colors of outer vestments, especially those worn by the presider or displayed as paraments, communicate the liturgical season. When used clearly and with understanding, vestments (with other visual arts and symbols) embody and support the proclamation of the word of God.

While the use and style of vestments will vary from place to place, certain vestments are common in churches that follow an ancient liturgical tradition: The stole is a long band of fabric worn by clergy over the alb as a sign of ordination since the eighth century. It is presented during the ordination rite. Stoles are worn in the color of the day, over the alb by ordained ministers. In fabric and color that usually matches the chasuble. It is a symbol of the yoke of obedience to Christ (see Matthew 11:28-30).

The chasuble is the principal vestment of the pastor who presides at the Eucharist. It is a very full vestment, in the appointed color of the church year, and is worn like a poncho over the alb and stole. It is a sign of the abundance of the eucharistic feast. It has been used as the distinctive eucharistic vestment since the eleventh century. At some services that don't include Holy Communion, a cassock (black close-fitting robe) and surplice (white knee length flowing garment) may be worn. The most important thing about worship is not the clothing, but these words of the psalmist: "Worship the LORD with gladness; come into his presence with singing" (Psalm 100:2).


